ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION IN OPEN SESSION

1. Amendment to Parking Fines Ordinance

Mr. Anthony stated this was a suggestion from the Police Department and Police Oversight Committee. Mr. Anthony stated there was a suggestion to increase the fee for parking fines from \$31- \$78 and make consistent with the Fire Lane fees.

Mr. McMillan asked if the Mayor believes a stable amount throughout the Township would be advisable. Mayor York stated yes, she believes that would be acceptable. Mr. Stroud stated he reviewed the fines of other local towns, and the towns were mainly in the mid \$50 range with only one town at \$85. Mr. Stroud stated he was in support of a raise to \$55 rather than \$78. Mr. Anthony stated the amount was recommended by the Police Committee. Mr. Stroud stated the proposed amount exceeds the state fine amount. Mr. McMillan, Mr. Lane, and Mayor York stated they were in support of the increase as suggested by the Police Department.

2. Collection Of Shortfall On Fees Due From The Ocean Grove Camp Meeting Association On Seasonal Single-Family Rentals In 2023

Mr. Stroud stated that he is frustrated that the public has asked for Mr. Bascom to be present, and the questions are being posed to other employees.

Ms. Narciso stated that the forensic audit showed that when the applications were submitted, the fee was set at the date of application, not of the seasonal rental applicable. Ms. Narciso stated the parcels in question, the tents would not be approved in the winter season because they do not have a heating element. The inspections were completed for the summer season. The properties were not occupied or inspected for the winter season. Ms. Narciso stated there were multiple changes made to the software to ensure that the error with the application would not occur again. There have been other measures implemented to the program once the error was identified. The application was in its infancy during the short-term rentals which led to some errors. Mr. Purgatorio stated there was no occupancy in the properties during the Winter Season. Mr. Purgatorio stated the answers provided by Mr. Ciccone were provided on a hypothetical situation. Mayor York stated that she was told by Mr. Ciccone that the fees for each season would apply. Ms. Narciso stated that Mr. Ciccone was answering on the information he had available to himself at the time. Ms. Narciso stated that the applicant did not occupy the tents or apply for the occupation of the property during the Winter season. Ms. Narciso stated the leases and applications state that the term of occupation will be only during the summer season. Mr. Purgatorio stated he was not sure if it was known at the time last year that the tents do not have heating elements.

Mr. McMillan confirmed with Ms. Narciso

Mr. Lane wanted to confirm the total amount of the shortfall was accurate to the resolution that was provided at the last meeting. Ms. Narciso confirmed this is accurate.

Mr. Anthony asked if there was any possibility that an occupant stayed past September 15. Mr. Purgatorio did not receive any complaints or have any information that would lead the Township to believe they were occupied past that date.

Mayor York asked to have Mr. Bascom and Mr. Ciccone attend the next meeting to continue the conversation.

Association. Mayor York went to the ROTC Awards and believed it was a great showcase of what the youth is capable of. Ms. York stated she attended an event about Women's History. Ms. York stated the Memorial Day Parade planning is occurring and if there is anyone interested in participating, they should reach to the parade committee. Ms. York also attended the strategic planning meeting with the school board. Ms. York attended a conference in Washington DC with the Urban Mayors Association. On

Saturday, there was a "Meet the Mayor" event at the VFW.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR

The Business Administrator will report on capital projects and matters of general interest.

- DPW Yard Improvements Phase II Pole Barn Construction: A pre-construction meeting was held last week in conjunction with Phase II of the various improvements being made to the Public Works Yard; specifically, the construction of a new pole barn. This project will include the construction of several engineered wood-framed structures along with a vehicle wash station, the renovation of an existing restroom, the construction of a 40'x40' classroom and the replacement and installation of several overhead garage doors. At present, the project is anticipated to begin in late April/early May and take approximately 180 days for final completion.
- Regional Flood Mitigation Meetings: In my February 12th report, I advised the Committee about efforts to develop a multijurisdictional hazard mitigation plan to address regional flooding issues in conjunction with our Federal, State and County representatives, as well as representatives from Neptune City and Bradley Beach. A follow up meeting attended by the relevant OEM, Engineering and Public Works representatives from all jurisdictions was held on February 28th. Items discussed included a review of available funding options, the need for each participating municipality to update or complete their Hazard Mitigation Plan for inclusion in the 2024 County Plan, identification of so-called "hot spot" projects, and the need for a Regional Stormwater Management Study. The next meeting of this group, which will include a broader range of participants inclusive of Administration, is currently being scheduled for early April.
- Homeless Encampment Issues: The Township held a meeting of our internal stakeholders last Thursday, along with our legal counsel, to discuss our legal options and potential next steps in our collaboration with the owner of the encampment property. As a result, our Special Counsel issued a communication to the property owner last Friday requesting that the deteriorating conditions at the encampment be remediated as soon as possible. The next Case Conference of the Monmouth County Continuum of Care is scheduled for April 10th.
- Rescheduled Egg Hunt and Egg Hunt at Dusk: The Neptune Recreation Egg Hunt previously scheduled for March 23rd will now be held tomorrow March 26th at 6pm sharp at Bert Willis Fields. This event is for children in pre-K through 5th grade. That event will be immediately followed by the Egg Hunt at Dusk, which begins at 7:45pm, also at Bert Willis Fields, and is for children in 6th through 9th grade.

Res#24- 189 Introduction of the Municipal Budget

Mayor York reads the following statement:

Tonight, the Township Committee is considering for introduction our 2024 Municipal Budget.

At a time where the township and our residents are dealing with significant inflation, the Township has continually worked to hold down costs and build financial stability to protect our community from the impacts of the economy while maintaining reserves sufficient meet the needs to our residents on good days and bad.

This budget is introduced with a tax rate decrease of 10.4%, reducing the municipal tax rate from 58.6 cents to a projected 52.5 cents per \$100.00 of assessed value. Based upon this, a homeowner with a value of \$500,000.00 for 2023 and 2024 would see a decrease in municipal taxes of \$304.00.

We recognize that under the annual assessment program, a good number of homes have seen significant increases in assessed value as a result of changes in the housing market and new construction. As such, homes that have increased in assessed value will see lesser reductions or even increased taxes dependent upon their percentage assessed value increase. Regardless, the reduction in the tax rate will reduce the impact on our taxpayers.

Overall, the amount to be raised by taxation has increased from \$33,359,000.00 to \$34,250,000.00, an increase of 2.67%

This governing body has continued to work hard to provide our residents and businesses with the services they expect, while holding the line on budget and tax increases wherever possible. Our focus remains on maintaining a strong financial position while continually investing in the community and supporting all departments to maintain the highest possible quality of life within our communities.

Neptune continues to be a full-service community, providing the most comprehensive sanitation and recycling program in the region. We maintain desirable parks and playgrounds and invest millions in repairing and reconstructing our sewer lines, drainage, and roadways.

Our staff is second to none. Every department works hard to support our community in any way possible.

All of our residents, from children to seniors, will benefit from improved recreational facilities, enhanced recreational opportunities and supportive services.

For the first time, we will be anticipating revenue from cannabis sales. A portion of these revenues will be directed to playground improvements and public safety improvements. In addition, funds from our opioid settlement will be utilized to provide additional assistance and support to overdose victims in an effort to reduce death and addiction in our community.

Taxpayers should be aware that our budget makes up approximately one-third of the overall tax bill, with the balance being paid to the schools, county, fire districts and the library. So, in reality, as a Township Committee, we control just 1/3 of your total property tax bill. The budget hearing that will be held in April will be limited to the municipal budget and our 1/3 of the tax bill. And although we have no control over the school budget, I feel obligated to speak out regarding our concerns about the state school funding formula that has stripped Neptune taxpayers of more than \$20 million dollars in aid over the past few years, including another \$4,000,000.00 loss this year. While I appreciate the efforts of Senator Gopal and Governor Murphy to create a fair school funding formula, I do not feel that all elements of fairness are being considered when calculating the distribution of state aid. Neptune Township needs to have our school aid restored. We are all concerned about the short-term and long-term impacts on our taxpayers and students. While I am sure that the elected

members of the Board of Education are doing everything within their power to address this problem, I would like to add our voices of support for a better plan and to offer our cooperation and assistance of the township in pursing such a plan.

The budget hearing will be held at the regular Township Committee meeting of April 29, 2024.

Name and Address Dr. James Brown Lakewood Rd.	Comment Dr. Brown stated he loves Neptune Township. Dr. Brown praised Senior Center in an article on Linked In. Dr. Brown stated the programs and bussing available through the
	Senior Center is wonderful.

Dr. Brown stated he would like to voice concern about the Ocean Grove North End Development and expressed issue with the proposed underground parking. Dr. Brown stated that Global Warming is going to lead to more flooding and will deteriorate Wesley Lake further with the runoff.

Joan Venezia Mt. Hermon Way Ms. Venezia thanked Committeeman Lane and Stroud for their presence at 45 Broadway but hope to see they continue their follow up.

Ms. Venezia stated she does not understand the CMA fees and asked if Camp Meeting has paid their fees.

Ms. Venezia stated the Township needs to answer questions about assessments that have been posed by the public.

Ms. Venezia asked if 63 Cookman has shown up to court and is the unsafe porch being

Ms. Venezia asked if people could speak at the Planning Board meeting on Wednesday. Ms. Venezia confirmed that the comments at the Planning Board must be related to the discussion at hand.

Ms. Venezia stated she does not believe the Ocean Grove North End Development Plan is not consistent with the Master plan and will follow up with the committee of her specific concerns.

Mr. Anthony stated Cookman Ave. was at court last week. The property indicated that repairs were made, but an inspector was not able to inspect the property. An inspector went out on Friday and all aspects were not corrected. Mr. Anthony will be seeking a trial with the judge. Mr. Anthony stated on the zoning aspect, a zoning plan was to be submitted. At this time, the application to zoning has not been submitted.

Shane Martin Mt. Hermon Way Mr. Martin stated that Neptune United released a press release regarding possible discrepancies in assessment. At this time, a response to the questions has not been released to Neptune United and Mr. Martins asked if the Township Committee has received a response. Mr. Martin asked if the statement was made on behalf of the Township Committee made by Gina LaPlaca in the Asbury Park Press. Mr. Martin asked why the committee has not received responses to the question and a statement was released. Mr. Martin stated there is an issue with the discrepancy with the payment process of the shortterm rentals

Mr. Stroud clarified that the "running out of money" comment was related specifically to a professional agreement for legal representation on a case.

Eliza Greenblatt Franklin Ave.

Ms. Greenblatt stated she had spoken to Joseph Ciccone about feedback he received to determine that the tents and cottages were subject to inspection. Ms. Greenblatt stated that Mr. Ciccone had spoken to her and indicated the tents and cottages would be required to get COs and would be required to get short term seasonals for Winter and Summer Season due to the lease agreement. Ms. Greenblatt stated there were tenants allowed to move in May 15 which would make them subject them to the Winter Season. Ms. Greenblatt does not agree with the amount addressed as missing and believes the Township Committee is not interested in collecting the shortfall.

Ms. Narciso stated the tents are not habitable in the winter season and the Township cannot issue a CI for the winter season. Ms. Narciso stated the COs are considered for new construction or rehabilitation, so the tents and cottages would not be subject to COs. Mr. Purgatorio stated the inspections were completed on the same date and the tents and cottages were not occupied.

Paul Martin Franklin Ave. Mr. Martin stated he does not understand how a statement is released without the Township Committee being aware of the comment. Mr. McMillan stated the Township Committee is made aware of the comments being submitted to the paper. Mr. Martin stated Neptune United submitted the questions to the Tax Assessor in November and has not been in receipt of answers. Mr. Martin asked if the Township Committee has reached out to the County to determine some of the necessary responses.

Ms. LaPlaca stated that the PR firm that the Township Committee hired, and Ms. LaPlaca was not comfortable assign her name to a statement that would be blessed by members of the committee. The PR professional stated he had the permission of the Mayor to move forward with the statement. Ms. LaPlaca stated that she would never have assigned her name to a statement that the Township Committee was not comfortable.

Mayor York stated she had not approved the first statement and had sent an amendment to the PR firm. Mayor York did not approve the statement that was released.

Cynthia Kleibart Broadway Ms. Kleibart stated that to a reasonable person, the elected officials are not following up on important matters. Ms. Kleibart stated there have been issues with CIs and discrepancy on assessments have not been followed up on.

Mayor York stated all the information that is brought to the Township Committee is reviewed with their professionals. Mayor York stated with the pier, the Township did their diligence to determine jurisdiction and were advised that the municipality does not have say. Mayor York also spoke to the CFO regarding the assessment matter and stated the Township has limited oversight.

Mr. Robinson stated the property owner indicates that he lives at 401 Overlook 50% of the year and wanted to ask if primary residence will be required.

Mr. Robinson also indicated that other towns have an "Animal House" ordinance and asked for it to be included in a new draft of the ordinance.

Mr. Robinson also questioned the assessment of the property 401 Overlook.

Senator Gopal is reaching out directly to VRBO and AirBNB to have the property removed due to the issues being created by the property.

Mr. Anthony stated there was drafts of the ordinance he has created to consider inclusion for the issues that Mr. Robinson made.

Eileen Michaels Seaview Ave. Ms. Michaels said there is difficulty hearing the stream on Town Hall Streams.

Ms. Michaels stated she was impressed with the Township Committee responding to the residents tonight.

Ms. Michaels stated she is upset Mr. Cafferty is not here because she wanted to address that Mr. Cafferty stated he has to listen to the advice of "my attorneys" and Ms. Michaels stated that the residents pay for the attorney.

Ms. Michaels stated she has realized the Township Committee is not reading the information they are voting on. Ms. Michaels requested that the Township Committee abstain from votes that they have not read or prepared for.

Sandra McKinley

Ms. McKinley has concerns about the climate is impacting the community. Ms. McKinley stated there have been Townships that adopt resolutions that support a lower carbon emissions or different level of preparations. Ms. McKinley has a draft resolution for the Township committee to consider having a 0 Carbon footprint.

Mr. McMillan stated that Committeeman Cafferty has been working with the Green Team and he said he would be happy to include him on this matter to consider for energy saving protocols.

Bill Borge

Mr. Borge asked what will be placed on the Chassis. Ms. LaPlaca stated the resolution 24-

Mr. Borge stated the streets look dirty because the claw that is picking up the debris is not being swept after. Mr. Borge was not satisfied with the performance of Public Works. Ms. Nelson stated the PR and marketing contract should be fired as Ms. LaPlaca has done a Cindy Nelson Highland Ave. wonderful job representing the Township and the Township Committee Ms. Nelson stated the two employees are the top performers. Ms. Nelson stated that Ms. Narciso and Mr. Purgatorio do a wonderful job and are more organized than ever before. Ms. Nelson expressed gratitude that a violation was issued to 401 Overlook. Ms. LaPlaca stated that there was a meeting on Friday regarding this matter. Ms. LaPlaca stated a tort claim was filed with the Township and the JIF is currently working on processing the claim.
