### TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE MEETING - JUNE 28, 2021

Mayor Brantley called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and requested the Clerk to call the roll. The following members were present: Keith Cafferty, Robert Lane, Jr., Nicholas Williams, Tassie D. York, and Mayor Michael Brantley.

Also present were Richard J. Cuttrell, Municipal Clerk; Vito D. Gadaleta, Business Administrator; and Gene Anthony, Township Attorney.

Mayor Brantley announced that the notice requirements of R.S. 10:4-18 have been satisfied by the publication of the required advertisement in The Coaster and the Asbury Park Press on May 27, 2021, posting the notice on the Board in the Municipal Complex, and filing a copy of said notice with the Municipal Clerk. In addition, the meeting agenda is posted on the Township web site (<a href="https://www.neptunetownship.org">www.neptunetownship.org</a>) and the meeting is being streamed live via townhallstreams.com.

The following items were discussed in open session:

Mr. Anthony reviewed the cannabis ordinance on for introduction at this meeting. The ordinance was prepared by the Township Planner. The ordinance contains six classes of licenses and designates where they are permitted. Mr. Gadaleta added that the State's 1,000 foot rule around schools will impact where they will be permitted. Mr. Cafferty questioned if the limit on the number of establishments is permitted. The Committee took action to introduce the ordinance during the regular business portion of the meeting.

Mr. Gadaleta stated that a Special Meeting is needed to approve the submission of a Green Acres application by the July 15<sup>th</sup> deadline. He recommended an application for funding to install a multi-purpose synthetic turf field at Loffredo Fields as well as added a building for equipment and utilities. T&M Associates has the preliminary work already completed and will prepare the application. The Committee agreed on July 12<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 p.m. for a Special Meeting solely to conduct a public hearing on the project and consider a resolution to submit the grant application.

Mr. Lane stated that the annual Independence Day parade in Ocean Grove will be held on July 3<sup>rd</sup>. Mr. Cafferty reminded everyone to take advantage of the various recreation programs available. The Mayor announced he will be periodically unavailable from July 4 to July 19.

# <u>AUTHORIZE AN EXECUTIVE SESSION AS AUTHORIZED BY THE OPEN PUBLIC MEETINGS ACT</u>

Mr. Lane offered the following resolution, moved and seconded by Mr. Williams, that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, Section 8 of the Open Public Meetings Act, Chapter 231, P.L. 1975, permits the exclusion of the public from a meeting in certain circumstances; and,

WHEREAS, this public body is of the opinion that such circumstances presently exist,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Neptune, County of Monmouth, as follows:

Contract negotiations - Sanitary sewer capacity agreement

Personnel – Recommendations to fill two DPW Driver vacancies

Personnel – Police Department Promotional Policy

Personnel – Litigation issues and Personnel Policies

- 3. It is anticipated at this time that the above stated subject matters will be made public when matters are resolved.
  - 4. This Resolution shall take effect immediately.

The Committee entered executive session for discussion on closed session matters.

Mr. Anthony, along with Mr. Gadalata and Mr. Bascom, spoke to the veterans organization that entered into an agreement with the Township to reserve sewer capacity years ago. They no longer are developing property in Tinton Falls so they no longer have the need for the capacity and do not want to make the annual payments. They did not pay the fee in 2020 and are not seeking reimbursement from prior years. There is a question as to whether or not they can be required to pay the 2020 fee pursuant to the agreement. The Committee indicated that the matter should be dropped to avoid litigation. The agreement will be severed with no payments or reimbursements due.

The Committee reviewed recommendations for the hiring of two Drivers in Public Works. The Committee took action during the regular business portion of the meeting.

The Committee discussed an amendment to the Township Code to define the position of Assistant Business Administrator. The amendment will be prepared by the Labor Attorney for the next meeting. The Mayor and Mr. Williams indicated that they will review the applications received for the position and advise the remainder of the Committee of their recommendation on which applicants to interview.

The Committee returned to the Meeting Room for the regular portion of the meeting.

Mayor Brantley called the regular meeting to order and requested the Clerk to call the roll. The following members were present: Keith Cafferty, Robert Lane, Jr., Nicholas Williams, Tassie D. York, and Mayor Michael Brantley.

Also present at the dais were Richard J. Cuttrell, Municipal Clerk; Vito D. Gadaleta, Business Administrator; and Gene Anthony, Township Attorney.

After a moment of Silent Prayer and the Flag Salute, the Mayor asked the Clerk to indicate the fire exits.

The Clerk stated, "Fire exits are located in the rear of the room and to my right. In case of fire you will be notified by bell and or public address system, then proceed to the nearest smoke-free exit"

#### **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

Mr. Cafferty offered a motion, seconded by Ms. York, to approve the minutes of the meeting held on June 14, 2021. All were in favor.

### **COMMENTS FROM THE DAIS**

Ms. York attended the Neptune High School graduation at the field behind Summerfield School. It was noted that for the first time in Neptune history, both the Valedictorian and the Salutatorian were both African-American. She also attended the bocce tournament in Neptune City.

Mr. Cafferty stated that the Recreation Department was offering a lot of programs this summer. He encouraged everyone to take a look and sign-up to participate.

Mr. Lane stated that the Neptune Senior Center is one of two centers in the County that are open. There will be a barbeque at the Center on June 30<sup>th</sup> and programs are continuing to take place. He attended the Neptune City bocce tournament. There will be a small group participating in the annual World Changers program in July and NJNG is sponsoring a barbeque at the beach for the kids. The Juneteenth celebration on June 19<sup>th</sup> was great. He attended the Neptune High School graduation and the NJROTC scholarship winners were in the program for the first time.

Mr. Williams stated that his daughter graduated from Neptune High School. The graduation ceremony was not quite the same as it is at the Great Auditorium but at least the kids were able to have a ceremony this year. The Library Trustees announced that the Library will be open on Mondays and Wednesdays starting July 19<sup>th</sup>. The plan is to open three days a week in August and full time in September all with time limits and a mask requirement.

Mayor Brantley attended the Juneteenth celebration at Midtown Commons. He will be unavailable from the July 4<sup>th</sup> weekend until July 19<sup>th</sup>.

### **BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT**

Mr. Gadaleta provided an update on Township projects as follows:

The Seaview Island Living Shoreline Project will begin on July 6. An email notice to all residents will be sent out this week.

The Neptune Soccer Association Tournament over this past weekend brought more than 100 youth teams to Neptune. It was a great event.

Route 66 at Green Grove Road Redevelopment Plan currently being prepared. Public comment period will follow.

Gateway Redevelopment Area (Routes 33 & 35) was approved by the Township Committee last meeting. We have met with the developer to begin the Redevelopment Plan process.

The Redevelopment Committee will be meeting this month to discuss the future of the Waterfront Redevelopment Plan.

The Business Administrator had an introductory meeting with a member of the former High Tech property ownership group. A future meeting with the Redevelopment Committee will be planned.

A virtual meeting was held with officials from Neptune, Ocean, Tinton Falls, NJDOT and the 11<sup>th</sup> Legislative District to discuss the status of the Route 66 project. Engineering is underway. Right of Way Acquisition is to begin this year. Construction is tentatively scheduled for 2025, but Assemblyman Houghtaling is working to move that date up and to also try and eliminate the roundabout planned for the project.

### PUBLIC COMMENTS ON RESOLUTIONS

Mayor Brantley asked for public comments regarding resolutions presented on this agenda only. The public was permitted to speak one time with a limit of five minutes.

Nancy Clarke, Embury Avenue, asked if property being assessed a lien, 58 Heck Avenue, is on abandoned property list. Mr. Cuttrell responded that it is inhabited and not on the list.

WHEREAS, the Township desires to issue the Note to the Sewer Operating Fund of the Township; and

WHEREAS, such Note shall bear interest at a rate of zero and zero hundredths percentum (0.00%) per annum, shall be dated July 9, 2021 and shall mature on July 8, 2022; and

Section 2. The Note is authorized to be issued to the Sewer Operating Fund of the Township.

Section 3. The Note shall be dated July 9, 2021 and shall mature on July 8, 2022, shall bear interest from its date, which interest shall be at a rate of zero and zero hundredths percentum (0.00%) per annum, and shall be in the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u>.

Section 4. The Note shall be subject to prepayment by the Township at any time prior to its stated date of maturity.

Section 5. The Note shall be executed by the Mayor and the Chief Financial Officer of the Township and the official seal shall be thereunto affixed and attested to by the Clerk of the Township. To the extent not otherwise determined by this resolution, it is hereby delegated to the Chief Financial Officer of the Township the authority to determine all matters in connection with the Note issued, and the signature of the Chief Financial Officer upon the Note shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. The Chief Financial Officer is also hereby authorized to sell part or all of the Note from time to time at a public or private sale and to deliver it to the purchaser thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price and accrued interest thereon from its date to the date of delivery thereof. ### PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR/PUBLIC COMMENTS

Mayor Brantley asked for public comments. The public was permitted to speak one time with a limit of five minutes. Comments were as follows:

Jill Cox, 20 Waterview Ct., asked why the Township refuses to enforce the noise ordinance at the Headliner/Oasis nightclub. She hears loud music and voices from 10:00 p.m. until 2:00 a.m. every day and on Sundays starting at Noon. She has sent emails since October, called the Headliner, and called the police to get the DJ turned down. She lives two blocks away and always has her windows closed. When she moved here, the bands ended at 10:00 p.m. She wants answers as to what will be done. Mr. Gadaleta stated that he received two police reports of noise complaints from the weekend. Mr. Anthony stated that he had a conference with the Police Department and the Township Committee amended the noise ordinance. He suggested that he meet with the Police Chief to further discuss.

Dianna Harris, 17 Willow Drive, asked is the maximum number of cannabis establishments permitted under the new ordinance. Mr. Anthony replied three. Ms. Harris asked if this includes smoke shops. Mr. Gadaleta responded no. She asked if the Assistant Business Administrator is a new position. Mr. Gadaleta responded that this will be the person that will transition into his position after retirement. Ms. Harris asked who is responsible for the West Lake Avenue redevelopment. The Mayor responded that the Redevelopment Committee is responsible. Ms. Harris thanked all who came out to the Juneteenth celebration, particularly Recreation and Public Works. She added that police officers were there each night to participate.

Rich Williams, 1 Abbott Avenue, stated that there is an issue with food trucks in Ocean Grove. He asked who approves the licenses and if the five minute movement rule is in place. Mr. Gadaleta stated the Mercantile License Officer issues the licenses and there is a rule that a vendor must move if he does not have a customer for five minutes. Mr. Williams asked if the non-idling rule applies to food trucks. Mr. Gadaleta stated that a group of vendors were floating a single license amongst themselves. One truck was issued a summons at Sunshine Village. The Mercantile Officer is recommended changes to the ordinance. He told Mr. Williams to contact the Police Department in the event further violations occur.

Chris Horning, 108 Highland Avenue, asked for the hours of operation for cannabis establishments. In regards to extrication labs, he has concerns about the permitted hours if power outages occur. Mr. Williams replied that the ordinance references hours of operation. Mr. Anthony stated that the Committee may need to address the cultivation situation.

Joyce Klein, Mt. Hermon Way, asked if food trucks are required to post their prices. Mr. Gadaleta responded that he will check the ordinance. Ms. Klein asked about the hiring process for Assistant Business Administrator. Mr. Anthony responded that a sub-committee will do the initial review of the applicants, then the full Township Committee will conduct interviews.

Nancy Clarke, Embury Avenue, stated that she was concerned about the porch supports falling at 57 Embury Avenue and the owner continually removes the abandoned property sign with contact information. Also, there are issues with the porch and broken windows at 37 Main Avenue.

Tara Sergenti, Asbury Park, stated that she heads the Cannabis Trade Association and helped co-author the cannabis bill at the State Legislature. She stated that micros are limited to the town, or an adjoining town, in which the owner resides. Micros are uncapped by the state and the Township should not place a cap on these because they will be run by members of the community. Limiting the number of establishments to three will cater to big business operations. She offered her

assistance in crafting the ordinance.

A union representative for the United Federation of Cannabis Workers stated that his union represents cannabis workers and Zen-Leaf is currently in collective bargaining. He urged a merit based system to include pollution, labor, and local ownership. He thanked the Committee for being open to the industry and for standing up for equity.

Michael Badger, OG Camp Meeting President, 129 Broadway, invited all to the Community Night on July 2<sup>nd</sup>, the Independence Day Parade and free concert in the Auditorium on July 3<sup>rd</sup>, and the Choir Festival on July 11<sup>th</sup>. The Camp Meeting Association hosted an end of season ROTC Program and would love to once again host the high school graduation in 2022.

Marcia Austin, 65 Heck Avenue, suggested a shuttle service for the flea markets and craft show. Mr. Gadaleta replied that a shuttle was done in the past and if the Chamber of Commerce wants to have a shuttle again, the Township would be interested.

Mr. Williams offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Cafferty, to adjourn. All were in favor.
