PRESENTATION

Declaring November as Registered Apprentice Month

WHEREAS, the Township of Neptune recognizes that registered apprenticeship is a vital component in building a stronger and fairer New Jersey through talent development in high-demand and high-growth sectors and constitutes a priority for the Governor's Administration, especially with the launch of the New Jersey Apprenticeship Network in 2018; and,

WHEREAS, the Township of Neptune recognizes that the 21st century economy demands a highly skilled workforce that possesses industry recognized post-secondary degrees and credentials, as well as the ability to respond immediately to changing economic and business needs; and,

WHEREAS, the registered apprenticeship system has been used for more than 85 years to meet the needs of employers seeking a highly skilled workforce and the needs of employees seeking a flexible training model which combines related technical instruction with structured on-the-job learning experiences; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Neptune recognizes USDOL Registered Apprenticeship programs as a viable career pathway for both college bound and non-college bound individuals; and,

WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey has more than 8,200 registered apprentices (21% net statewide increase) and more than 1,126 registered apprenticeship sponsors (84% statewide increase); and,

WHEREAS, completion of an apprenticeship program leads to an industry-driven, nationally recognized credential that certifies occupational proficiency,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT PROCLAIMED, that, l, Nicholas Williams, Mayor of the Township of Neptune, along with the entire Township Committee, do hereby proclaim the month of November as Registered Apprenticeship Month in the Township of Neptune.

• South Riverside Drive/Shark River Hills "Living Shoreline" Project: Work on the South Riverside Drive Living Shoreline project in Shark River Hills began last week with the Department of Public Works replacing two outfall pipes. The full project will begin in earnest in mid-November, with a target completion date of December 31st (or earlier). Residents interested in learning more about the project can attend the meeting being held tomorrow night, October 25th at 7pm at the Marina Building, in partnership between the Township and the Shark River Hills Property Owners' Association. Presentations will also be given on flood zones and developments since Superstorm Sandy, flood insurance and

Tidelands claims.

- Ocean Grove Tennis Courts/Sinkhole: Pending approval by the Committee this evening, a contractor has been identified and authorized to begin making repairs to the tennis courts at Broadway and Central Avenue in Ocean Grove. I have also asked the Department of Public Works to coordinate with OGCMA on the proposed work schedule and any necessary easements the Township needs to obtain.
- Wreaths Across America: Neptune Township will once again be hosting a ceremony for National Wreaths Across America Day on December 17th. The ceremony will take place at 12:00pm at Veterans Memorial Park. Following the program, volunteers will proceed to Mount Calvary Cemetery to place remembrance wreaths on the graves of more than 400 veterans. This is done in partnership with the Rotary Club of Asbury Park, and we thank them for their annual efforts to remember our fallen heroes.

Ms. Philpart stated she has lived in the neighborhood for 20+ years. There are violations of commercial vehicles and dumpsters being parked in front of residences. The

607 Sayre and 1806 Odin are the properties in question that are parking multiple commercial vehicles and dumpsters that have trash in them.

Many times, the issue is that vehicles are parked at night so code enforcement is not available. Mayor Williams asked if the police

department may be able to enforce it as well. Barbara Burns, 4 Ocean Ms. Burns asked what the plan is for patrolling for Halloween. Last Ave. year there were issues with vandalism. Mayor Williams stated he will ask the Chief of Police about the types and amount of patrol assigned on Halloween. Ms. Hecker asked about an update for cross walks and speed limits, Julie Hecker, 113 Pilgrim how is the public advised that the public is aware that the issues are Pathway addressed. Ms. Hecker had requested additional signage in Ocean Grove for speed limits and additional signage and painted lines in Ocean Grove. Beverly Holland, 56 N. Ms. Holland thanked the Committee for their work to have the Taylor Ave. Apt. 37 roads in the Gables. Ms. Holland asked about a neighbor who has a small box truck which is used to collect scrap metals. Ms. Holland asked if there were an ordinance that would not allow such a vehicle on the street. Mr. Anthony stated there is an ordinance that addresses the tonnage of vehicles and whether they are allowed to be parked in specific areas as well as commercial vehicles are not allowed to be parked in residential zones. Joan Venezia, 107 Mt. Ms. Venezia stated there were 2 occurrences of 18+ years old Hermon Way groups on Halloween who took things from porches and even took from the hands of a resident. It was also noted that a car was stolen that night as well. Ms. Venezia expressed concerns about groups of young adults. Ms. Venezia asked about the procedure for the Historic Preservation Committee Special Meeting. Mr. Anthony stated he is not the attorney for this board to advise on that matter.
